New Viola syllabus and publications

AMEB's new Viola syllabus introduces students to a diversity of styles and techniques.

The new Viola Level 1 technical work, sight-reading and repertoire are now closely aligned with the Violin Level 1 syllabus. This helps students who might move between instruments in the early stages of learning and supports a consistent experience for teachers and examiners across the two syllabuses.

The new syllabus lists and the Viola Series 2 repertoire books (Preliminary to Grade 4) encourage study of a variety of styles as Manual Lists are now structured according to historical period. A Certificate of Performance examination has been introduced after Grade 8, serving as

a culmination of Level 2 studies and supporting preparation for the Associate Diploma examination.

New Teaching syllabuses and resources

A new AMEB Teaching syllabus will be available for examination from 2024.

The new AMEB Teaching syllabus aims to develop the ability of instrumental and vocal teachers in line with international best practice and with reference to leading scholarship on music pedagogy from around the world.

The new syllabus comprises two awards: The Certificate Teacher of Music Australia (CTMusA) and the Associate Teacher of Music Australia (ATMusA). Assessment is through a series of written and practical tasks.

Have you considered Ensemble Performance examinations?

'You can imagine what this does for their playing and the pride in their ensemble achievements'.



AMEB Ensemble Performance exams have been a "most successful" inclusion in the instrumental music program of Hamilton and Alexandra College, notes Director of Music, Ben Hiscock.

"We have numerous ensembles including a number of chamber groups and the feedback from the group examinations has been very positive. Whilst a number of our students sat for individual examinations and group examinations, as a confidence builder and music program driver, the group examinations had great benefit."

At the Hamilton and Alexandra College, Ensemble Performance examinations were combined with AMEB Grade examinations hosted by the school. "The amount of repertoire being played by the students has quadrupled with a number of students undertaking three or four examinations over the two-day period (solo, quartet, string orchestra)," said Ben.

Examinations are available across eight grades and two diplomas in Strings, Woodwind, Brass, Percussion and Mixed Ensemble

AMEB's Performance Evaluation program

The AMEB Performance Evaluation Program aims to encourage and motivate students by providing achievable goals, feedback on progress, and recognition of their efforts.

Students have an opportunity to perform an individually-selected program of work for an AMEB Examiner and receive constructive feedback, without being graded.

Performance Evaluation is useful for students whose study programs do not align with the requirements of AMEB Practical Exams, as the content of the evaluation is established by the teacher and customised to the needs of the individual student.

An AMEB Performance Evaluation might be suitable for students who:

- are learning in a Suzuki or Yamaha program
- are learning in a group
- are preparing for a VCE examination
- would value feedback prior to an AMEB examination (e.g. an Associate or Licentiate Diploma exam)
- are progressing through a development program that does not align with AMEB Practical exam requirements

Students have the option of enrolling in one of the Metropolitan or Regional sessions, or a Performance Evaluation by video.



What is P Plate Piano?

Designed for beginners, the AMEB P Plate Piano program aims to build confidence in performing and exams.

P Plate Piano is a series of three bright, colourful piano books for beginner pianists who have completed their first tutor.

The books are designed to complement the teacher's existing teaching methods

and provide perfect preparation for AMEB Preliminary Piano or Preliminary Piano for Leisure. The books feature stunning artwork, fun activities and informative text written by nationally respected music educator, Elissa Milne.

To build confidence in performing and exams, students can choose to take a non-

graded AMEB assessment on completion of each book. At the end of the assessment, every student is presented with a certificate by the examiner recognising their achievement and a written report is mailed to the teacher. P Plate Piano assessments are also available by pre-recorded video submission.



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
